



The simple lesson from a plant

Looking around us is a simple but effective way to learn. We would like to share a lesson that we have seen while watching the plants at our balcony.

It was because we love our place to be cosy that we decided to have some green on our balcony. So we travelled with a local 'tuk-tuk' to the close by place where they sell plants and stuff (an informal shop just on the side of the road) and soon after that we found some plants. Nice green bushes with red flowers, beautiful! So, after a little talk and some bargaining we headed home with the plants in the 'tuk-tuk'. And yes, the result was what we expected, it was just so much nicer.

But, soon after that the flowers disappeared and what remained was a green bush, not so nice as it was

before. It was still alive of course but it didn't florish as before. It was a pity! We've just kept the plants and give them some water every day. Then, lately, we saw a lot of new knobs begin to grow, and by now one of the two plants is as red as before, having beautiful flowers again. The other plant isn't yet full of flowers but they will come soon. All the plants needed was a little time, rest and care to settle and get used to their new place.

We feel a bit like these plants. During the last year we felt like we have been moved to much and, after a difficult time, had to 'root' again. Our 'flowers' disappeared. It took time to get used to things again and, at last, to flourish and strive again.

We don't know to what extent this analogy works. Do we already see the flowers or do we only see some knobs yet? Are we striving already? However, we feel like we are 'home' more than

before and we enjoy growing relations and friendships. It is amazing to be able to connect to people in their own beautiful language.

The analogy does go at least a little bit further. We water the plants because of the hot climate here. They grow and flourish because of that. In the same way our God did and does take care of us every day anew!

We as well do florish by His care. He knows what we need and provides, we want to trust Him. He who made that plants (Psalm 121) does also take care of us. Every day. Isn't He amazing?

grammar and how a language 'works'. From time to time we have homework tasks and we are sent on the streets every now and than to question people about a certain topic.

Lately there was a feast called "Pchum Ben", and we asked the people what this all meant. What does it mean and what do people do? During these talks we gain insight in the culture more and more. Why do people do the things the way they do them..? Very interesting!

The language school organises lessons on culture every Friday. Think about a Cambodian wedding, or how does hierarchy work here? A African joke says "western people have clocks, we have time"... To what extend does this apply to the Cambodian people? These are all examples in which we have a lot to learn.

Culture and religion are closely intertwined with each other. Most of the Cambodian people are Buddhist and all elements of it are found in the culture. It is interesting to explore more and more of it. We see, for example, that fear plays a big role in their lives.

On the contrary we have a love, given by our God and Father that is without fear. We long to testify of this great love, even now when our language is still so limited.

Please pray for us to

understand the people more and more, both their language and the cultural parts!

Ultimately we have not moved to Cambodia to study the language and culture but we would like to help the people here and share our faith is Jesus Christ with them. In our previous newsletter we have informed you about our partnership with GOWW and the fact that they stopped working with us.
